

Safe Quiet Lakes Mission:



Make the Muskoka lakes safer and quieter to ensure the sustainable enjoyment of a treasured shared resource.





2017 Survey

- Over 3200 responses (up from 2200 in 2013)
 - Large, diverse pool of respondents
- Clear statement of what is important to the people who use and care about the lakes.
- Thanks to everyone who took the time to participate



Key Findings: Safety Concerns

The 3 most frequently mentioned safety concerns are:

Power boats

- not following "the rules of the road"
- operating at high speeds
- creating large wakes



Key Findings: Opportunities

- A majority (61% to 71%) favour top four measures
 - Establishing "no wake" zones,
 - Enforcing laws on illegal mufflers,
 - Enforcing laws on boating under the influence and
 - Establishing clear decibel limits on noise

And, 72% of all respondents support increased education and communication

New Education Programs

- We are acting on these results and input from our Stakeholder meeting:
 - Speed regulations
 - Reducing wake
 - Muffler Noise
 - Reporting to the OPP
 - Advocacy Initiatives



What is the speed limit?

- The speed limit within 30 m of shore is 9 km/hr on the Muskoka Lakes and rivers
- Includes docks and other boats underway
- How far is 30 m?



Reducing Your Wake

When slowing down for no-wake

zones:


- Throttle back to idle for approximately 10 s.
- Wait for the bow to drop before proceeding
- Keep an eye on your wake until clear of the no-wake zone





What are the rules about engine noise?

- Driving an unmuffled boat or bypassing the muffler, is illegal within 5 km of shore
- If you feel a boat is violating the law you can report it to the OPP



Reporting Incidents to OPP

Report

reckless boating, speed to close to shore and other objects, boats without mufflers

Gather as much information as you can

Registration number, Make, Model, , Colour Time or frequency, Location Description of the operator



Question re Buoys and Inflatables

- Opinion is divided majority do not object to the presence of large inflatable toys.
- According to a source at Transport Canada:
 - "Authorization is required under the NPA for any works that are in, on, over, through or across a Navigable Scheduled waterway, this includes all swim rafts and water toys."



Advocacy

- Advocacy Committee and Board studying the practicality and desirability of advocating for:
 - Decibel limits
 - No wake zones
 - Use of lake load tools (Recreational Carrying Capacity, Boating Impact Studies) for development assessments
