





Lake Joseph North Association Minutes Of Annual General Meeting

July 30, 2022 – At Gordon Bay Marine and by Zoom

The meeting began at 9:03 am in person and via Zoom call. In attendance at Gordon Bay Marina were President Nancy Cohen, Treasurer Shelley Spence, Secretary James Buchanan, and Directors Elizabeth Jennings, Harris Ord, Frances Carmichael, Alex Magditsch, Diana Piquette, Blair Sinclair, and Bruce Hatherley. A total of 90 persons were in attendance in person and 25 joined by Zoom. Two proxies were received.

President Nancy Cohen explained the logistics for the Zoom call and welcomed all members. The agenda was presented and approved.

Municipal Election

Frances Carmichael reminded members of the October 2022 municipal election in Seguin Township. Members are eligible to vote on-line.

Frances welcomed three candidates for the election and asked them to briefly address our members. Two candidates have been acclaimed.

Mayor Ann MacDiarmid described events and progress over the past term in office. There have been several changes in senior staff, including the CAO and the planning department. These are expected to improve the community experience with the township. Other initiatives included: Trails Master Plan, the Official Plan Review, the community swimming pool, and airport improvements. Initiatives in progress include: a Ministerial Zoning Order to authorize 700 acres of land to be available for residential housing, a Shoreline Alteration By-law, and an improved approach to short-term rentals.

Ward 4 Councillor Terry Fellner described his contributions over the past term. He was an active member of the Committee of Adjustment and regularly reviewed applications, visited properties and consulted with neighbours and applicants. He contributed to the township roads strategy with the objective of including seasonal roads and traffic in the plan and to ensure proper rebuilding of problematic roads. He was also involved in the Park to Park initiative and was the township representative on the Pool Corporation. Ward 3 Councillor Rod Osbourne cited his contributions to the Trails Master Plan, the Pool Wellness Centre and the airport improvements. He explained his position that the private sector should address the high speed internet access issue. Over the next few years he would like to see closer adherence to the Environment First philosophy for the township, penalties for waste transfer site violations, and reinstatement of a property standards bylaw.

The other candidate for Ward 3 Councillor, Gary Getty, was unable to attend.

Frances facilitated several questions for the candidates from members.

Presidents Report

In her President's report, Nancy reminded members of the role of the LJNA and acknowledged that it began 25 years ago. Then as now, LJNA goals include: preservation of the environment, building consensus, working collaboratively with others, educating our members, and staying politically involved.

The past years highlights include restarting the water quality initiatives, launching Benthic testing, and preparing for the Fireboat launch on September 3.

Priorities for the new year include promoting participation in the municipal election, continued monitoring of rezoning applications, involvement in the OP review, and new initiatives with respect to boating safety and reviewing our bylaws.

Treasurers Report

Shelley Spence, Treasurer, referred to the financial statements which had been distributed and presented the financial results for the 2021-22 fiscal year and the budget for the coming year. Highlights include excess receipts over disbursements of \$ 6,311 and reserves of \$ 32,045.

Shelley explained the Board's decision to combine the various reserve funds into one fund called LJNA Special Initiatives. This fund will will enable us to act quickly to respond to one-time issues should the need arise. Shelley took questions from the members.

Municipal Affairs

James Buchanan, Director for Municipal Affairs and a member of the Seguin Official Plan Steering Committee outlined the general activities of the Municipal Affairs Committee over the preceeding year. The committee actively reviews applications for minor variances and zoning by-law changes. In certain situations, letters of objection are submitted where the proposed changes seem inappropriate to our members broadly and direct neighbours to the property in question. The Official Plan review is proceeding slowly. The Steering Committee was formed almost two years ago. A planning consultant has led multiple rounds of conversations on major planning topics. The first draft of the new plan was completely restructured from the current plan making it difficult to track changes. Multiple additional iterations will be required before it is ready for public feedback.

At this time, it appears that issues raised by LJNA will be largely addressed in the final draft. If feasible, a survey of members will be conducted adjacent to the public consultation process.

Election of Directors

Nancy Cohen shared a proposed slate of Directors and Officers for the 2022-23 year. The slate was endorsed by a vote of members. This was:

Invited Guests - Safe Quiet Lakes Update

Diana Piquette, Chair of Safe Quiet Lakes and Greg Wilkinson presented an update of their activities including an overview of the 2021 survey results. Of the nearly 6000 respondents, 217 were LJNA members. The survey results showed majority support for

- Establishing "No wake" zones to protect people and wildlife
- Establishing standards for minimum distance from shore for watersports
- Stronger enforcement of boating while under the influence
- Enforcing laws about illegal above-water exhausts frequently and consistently.

And increased readiness for legislation, enforcement and education.

They then gave an overview of recent initiatives including the Decibel Coalition and the BeWakesAware campaign. They thanked LJNA for their continued support.
